
'It has inspired me to read a lot more and now I want to write my own books as well!'



# Supporting your child's mental health

The school was fortunate to host a workshop for parents/carers led by a representative from local charity Sussex, Mind. The presentation was extremely informative and provided parents with some useful strategies and advice. Our presenter also highlighted the excellent support and guidance that is available on the <u>Youngminds website</u> and the referral process for help via the <u>Single Point of Access (SPOA)</u>.

#### **Attendance**

The one thing that makes the greatest difference to every child's well-being, attainment and general social skills is attendance to school.

If your child is struggling to attend school, there are plenty of steps that can be taken to help. Early intervention is best and this usually starts with a meeting with parent/carers, the child and head of house. Please contact us if you are concerned and let us support you.

#### **Online Safety**

Understanding the risks that are posed online is tricky for all ages. We all have a role to play in ensuring children know to keep themselves safe whilst using the internet to play games, communicate with friends or view content. In school, online safety is part of our RHPD curriculum and is routinely a key part of our tutor time activities. For parents and carers, it can seem like an impossible task, but there is a lot of advice and support available. In particular, there is excellent guidance available from the NSPCC.

If you are concerned about criminal exploitation and any form of online sexual abuse, <a href="CEOP">CEOP</a> is a good place to go to report your concerns and also seek further advice.

Your child's head of house is always available for support should you need it.

### Teaching and Learning Top Tips and Resources

As I lead on teaching and learning at The Weald, I am lucky enough to work with a range of colleagues across the school as well as parents and carers. I have recently worked with some Year 7 and 8 parents in our autumn term learning walk events.

These events embody our ethos of opportunity and community as they welcome parents and carers

as crucial stakeholders into the school, where we engage with them on how they can support their child's education. We always begin these events by outlining the well founded educational research on the importance and impact of parental engagement on a child's educational outcomes.

"Students whose parents are involved in their learning are more likely to have higher grades and test scores, attend school more regularly, have better social skills, show improved behaviour and adapt well to school" (EEF). Our mantra is that we work best, when we work together!

What we also share is that one of the three top factors affecting the level of parental involvement is a lack of knowledge about curriculum. This can be especially challenging for parents and carers once their child is in secondary school, with so many subjects and curriculums.

In order to begin to address this, these events (alongside the many opportunities we use to engage with parents and carers in our community) allow us to outline some of the key elements of teaching and learning at The Weald. We also reference and share some key documents. This year many parents have urged us to share with you all more widely, as they felt they were so useful in supporting them in supporting their children's learning at home.

So I am sharing these here along with some top tips on how they can support your child in their home learning.

<u>Curriculum Maps:</u> These documents map out the learning journey for each subject from Year 7 to Year 13 and outline the key content which will be covered. They are in each subject curriculum area <u>on our website</u> <u>here</u>. They are also linked at the top of each tracking report you receive. They are useful to see where your child is on that journey and also to help go over any areas they feel less confident in. They are a great place to start as they link to all of the knowledge organsiers for that subject.

<u>Knowledge Organisers:</u> These documents summarise the key knowledge for a topic; the key ideas, keywords and important information that students need to know and remember. They are linked on the curriculum maps, but teachers also give these out and use them in lessons so they will be in students' books. They might also be shared online (e.g. on Google Classroom). Students will also be set homework to learn these. We use a set of techniques called RED Review.





RED Review Resources: Here we outline the effective activities students should use to help them commit knowledge to memory. Research shows that students typically pick low impact strategies which make the information feel familiar (like highlighting, making notes or reading over information). However RED Review strategies feel hard, but really help students remember more, for longer. R = Retrieval (doing anything that makes you retrieve or remember things without looking). E = Elaboration (explaining knowledge, why it works or how it compares/connects). D = Dual Coding (combining words and pictures to help build stronger memories).

## Teaching and Learning Top Tips and Resources continued...

<u>RED Review Homework Task Bank:</u> Teachers will be setting more frequent RED Review homework tasks and will show students how to use these techniques effectively in lessons. We might set tasks, like these from a bank of 24 tasks to help students get started with this method of learning. These tasks can be practised on a knowledge organiser and can be used at any time - even when students say they have 'no homework'!



PLCs and Pre-Assessment Letters: Students have two yearly assessments in all their subjects. We report their progress in these assessments to you on tracking reports 2 and 3. Around a month before each assessment the Head of Year will write to parents and carers with a list of the topics and knowledge organisers which will be set as RED. Review homework, to help prepare. These can be used as checklists for learning. Some subjects/years will also have PLCs (Personal Learning Checklists), which give students their own individual topic checklist, so students can rate them red, amber or green and then work through them.


I hope that these give you a useful summary of the key resources that we are developing to create knowledgeable, confident and indent learners. Our goal is that by understanding them yourself, they will help you to understand your child's curriculum and to understand how they can best regularly review their learning.

As we prepare for Christmas holidays and the colder weather that winter brings, we begin to want to cosy in and relax at home - the Danish call this, Hygge. This is translated as a quality of cosiness and comfortable conviviality that engenders a feeling of contentment or well-being (regarded as a defining characteristic of Danish culture). What better way to get into the Hygge way than to cosy up with a book over the Christmas holidays and January blues.

The library has a host of books for everyone, here are some of our favourites.

#### KS3 Dreadwood by Jennifer Killick AR level 4.9 AR points 7.0

It's basically the worst school detention ever. When classmates (but not mate-mates) Hallie, Angelo, Gustav and Naira are forced to come to school on a SATURDAY, they think things can't get much worse. But they're wrong. Things are about to get seriously scary.

What has dragged their teacher underground? Why do the creepy caretakers keeping humming the tune to Itsy Bitsy Spider? And what horrors lurk in the shadows, getting stronger and meaner every minute . . .? Cut off from help and in danger each time they touch the ground, the gang's only hope is to work together. But it's no coincidence that they're all there on detention. Someone has been watching and plotting and is out for revenge . . .

#### KS4 A Berlin Love Song by Sarah Matthias AR level 6.0 AR points 15.0


Max is 17, a German schoolboy, when he meets Lili, a trapeze artist from a travelling circus that performs every year in Berlin. Lili is from a Romani gypsy family whose life and customs are very different from those of Max and his family. Their friendship turns into love - but love between a member of the Hitler youth and a gypsy is forbidden. As events tear them apart can their love survive? Set against the backdrop of the Second World War, A Berlin Love Song is a love story of passion, unexpected friendship, despair, loss and hope. It exposes the extermination of the Roma and Sinti referred by Angela Merkel as the forgotten holocaust.

#### KS5 and adult The Winter Spirits by Various Authors

The tradition of a haunted tale at Christmas has flourished across the centuries. These twelve stories - authored by some of today's most loved and lauded authors of historical and gothic fiction - are all centred around Christmas or Advent, boldly and playfully re-imagining a beloved tradition for a modern audience.

### Our Library lending system

Earlier this academic year we launched our new Library Lending System which allows students, staff and you to see what books we have in stock. For those in Year 7 and 8 it will also show you the AR (Accelerated Reader) level.

As a parent/carer, you can log in to the Weald Accessit LRC Lending system and use the guest log in.



This will take you to the home page, where you can search for books by subject, author and title. Once you find a book you can see where in the Library it can be found, for example the Sport, Life and Love, or Adventure section.

The bit we are most excited about is the review section. This is a great way for students to recommend reading to one other. Each student that reviews a book and gets it published after it's been checked by staff will receive a house point.

As part of the fortnightly Year 7 and 8 lessons, readers are encouraged to complete an Accelerated Reader test after they have finished reading their book to register how many words they have read. As this is best done within 48 hours of finishing the book, these can also be completed by students at home on our school AR website. The class that has read the most words each month will be awarded with biscuits as part of their library lesson. Those becoming Word Millionaires will of course also receive the prestigious badge and will be invited to an exclusive celebration in the summer term.

#### Year 7 Unifrog Launch

Unifrog was launched to our new Year 7 cohort in the form of an assembly on Tuesday 28 November 2023, to complement our overall careers programme, Students in Years 8 - 11 already have their accounts and utilise the platform throughout the academic year.

Unifrog is a complete destinations platform; it helps students explore and compare their options after school and sixth form plus access labour market information and receive support with writing competitive recruitment and selection documentation such as CVs and UCAS personal statements.

Alongside using Unifrog in careers personal development lessons, we have also provided termly tutor time slots for students to record their achievements and the careers competencies they are developing to support them with making future study and work-related applications.

All students in Year 10 are currently being offered an impartial and one-to-one careers interview with our external Careers Advisors, Mrs Thompson and Ms Armstrong.

Working with qualified and CDI-registered careers guidance practitioners, students have been supported in their careers interview to explore their aspirations, plan their future study pathways and research their employment options.

After their careers interview, each student has received a careers action plan with personalised targets to complete and aim towards; this is uploaded to their Unifrog profile. In addition to our Year 10 sessions, Miss O'Brien has been offering support guidance sessions to students in Year 11 who are unsure of their Post 16 Destinations and Years 12 and 13 to support with Post 18 Destinations.
