What were the key turning points of WW2? Students learn about several key turning points of WW2 and the beginnings of the Cold War.

Revolutions: From the industrial revolution to understanding why Britain didn't have a 'revolution' as France did, to the foundations of the slave trade - students will end the year on this fascinating breadth study.

Students start their journey of learning history at the Weald with a series of lessons about 'What is History?' where skills and array of topics will be taught to ground students in the discipline of the subject.

Romans to Normans: How did conquest change Britain? Students will learn a local history unit on the conquest of England, diving into the study of the Roman occupation of West Sussex before learning about invasions of Britain by other groups and the depth study of the Norman Conquest of Britain.
