Assessments in core subjects (English, Maths and Science) will take place in exam venues (e.g. the School Hall) and all other subjects will complete their assessments in their usual classrooms. Your child will receive an exam timetable via email.

These assessments will check learning from across Key Stage 4 and will allow your child to demonstrate the progress they are making in the curriculum. We will share the results of these assessments (in the form of a % and grade) in their next tracking report. The following subjects will not be setting an in-class assessment during the assessment window:

**Travel and Tourism** -Travel and tourism students are currently studying an area of the course assessed through an assignment brief.

**RS** -RS students have just completed their second mock and their final exams will take place on the 9th and 16th May.

**Drama** - Students will be assessed on their recent monologue performances and written exam answers.

**Art, ceramics and textiles -** There will not be an exam in April. Students will be assessed at this point on their ongoing coursework projects. Y10 students will sit a 1x day exam for the arts subjects later in the summer term when they will complete a final piece for their Y10 coursework unit.
