Community

This term we explored the idea of community with all our students (Year 7 to Year 13) through our whole school assemblies. We looked at what it means to be part of a community and the glue that holds communities together and makes them positive cohesive places. We explained two key concepts: prosocial behaviour and integrity.



Prosocial behaviour is anything that benefits other people or society as a whole, such as helping, sharing, donating, co-operating and volunteering. Other, potentially less obvious, prosocial behaviour is obeying the rules and conforming to socially accepted behaviours such as queuing, saying please and thank you or tidying up after yourself. We explained that all these elements of prosocial behaviour are really important to their school and create a cohesive well functioning community.

We introduced the idea of integrity through a thought experiment would staff and students hand in a lost £20 note in differing situations. Integrity determines how an individual responds to this situation and it is a quality that is highly valued by employers, friends and family. We explained that integrity is doing the right thing when nobody's watching (eg. handing in the £20 note).

Throughout the year we witness lots of examples of students doing the right thing and have recently been complemented by visitors after our Year 6 Open Evening. Students were kind, polite and supported others. Thank you and well done. We look forward to celebrating further examples as the year progresses and they continue to embody our Ready Respectful Working Safe (RRWS) approach.

Parents' Evenings 2023/24

Following on from last academic year we are continuing to have parents' evenings on the virtual school cloud platform. The feedback received via the questionnaires following the parents' evenings was very positive. In addition to this we have seen an increase in attendance to the meetings across all year groups.

However, we fully appreciate not everyone has had a positive experience with the technology causing some issues with appointments. All the feedback has been passed back to the school cloud customer and technical support teams to improve the product.

In addition to this, as a school we would like to offer further technical support to any family who has experienced a technical issue during a previous parents' evening. If you had issues with a device or internet connection, we are able to provide an area within our LRC for you to login for your virtual parents' evening appointments. If you previously experienced a technical issue we will have drop-in sessions available with our network support team to check your login and test connectivity to appointments, using your device, before parents' evenings. If you would like to benefit from this support please <u>complete this short form</u>.

Parents' evenings have traditionally been on one evening only and we have split these evenly between Wednesday and Thursday evenings across the academic year. We appreciate this may not be the most convenient day of the week for parents and also part time staff are unavailable for appointments on a day they do not work, and this can be a frustration for parents.

With this in mind, we would like to gain your feedback on a proposal around parents' evenings moving forward:

• **Option one** would be to keep the format the same as we currently have, for parents' evenings to be on one evening of the week, either a Wednesday or a Thursday.

• **Option two** would be to move to parents' evenings being spread across two evenings. Parents would know in advance which evening staff are available so you could plan your evenings before bookings opened. Staff would either choose to spread their total available hours for meetings across one or both evenings. It would not be mandatory for staff to be available on both evenings. Part time staff would be able to attend one of the two evenings increasing the accessibility of staff to parents.

To provide your feedback please <u>complete this short questionnaire</u>. The deadline for providing feedback is 9am Monday 13th November.

This proposal has also been put forward to staff following feedback from our staff voice and discussions with other schools who run this parents' evening model. Until feedback has been received from both parents and staff in this consultancy period, no changes will be made to the current parents' evening setup. Further communication will follow to parents after this consultation period has completed during the week beginning 13th November. The next parents' evening in the calendar is Year 12 & 13 on Thursday 7th December.

KS5 & Adult Tomorrow and Tomorrow and Tomorrow by Gabrielle Zevin


This is the story of Sam and Sadie. It's not a romance, but it is about love.
