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Habits and routines

Being ready, respectful, working and safe is our basic student expectation at The Weald School. Well done to our students for demonstrating this excellently this year. To build on this we have been focusing on students getting habits and routines (norms) right this year to set them up to succeed. We introduced these ideas to students in our House Standards Assembly delivered by Mrs Edwards and Mr Catt in September. The message was that **good habits make life easier** for families, students and teachers. We gave students the analogy of 4 rowers (sculls).



We asked students to imagine a team of 4 rowers who have poor habits and a bad routine. What would that look like?

With poor habits and bad training routines they definitely won't win a race let alone complete the course by moving in a straight line. Their efforts may even become frustrating with a desire just to give up and stop rowing altogether.

The message to repeat at home is "A good year means committing to rowing together, even when it is hard, because it's the best thing for you, your teacher and fellow students (and your family)"

Here are ten habits they should commit to this year:

- 1) Arrive on time
- 2) Know what to do in the first 5 mins (write the title and date, complete the starter)
- 3) Go to the toilet at break times
- 4) Eat and drink properly
- 5) Sleep get to bed by 10pm
- 6) Have the right equipment pack the night before and have a pencil case with PRPR+C+book
- 7) Do homework as early as possible
- 8) Keep their books well presented
- 9) Attend a club
- 10) Be kind and work hard

Ultimately good routines enable students to spend more time focusing on their learning. Thank you for your continued support and we wish all students a successful year built on good habits and routines.






The Upstarts - Uber, Airbnb and the Battle for the New Silicon Valley by Brad Stone Ten years ago, the idea of getting into a stranger's car, or walking into a stranger's home, would have seemed bizarre and dangerous, but today it's as common as ordering a book online. Uber and Airbnb are household names: redefining neighbourhoods, challenging the way governments regulate business and changing the way we travel.

In the spirit of iconic Silicon Valley renegades like Steve Jobs and Bill Gates, a new generation of entrepreneurs is sparking yet another cultural upheaval through technology. They are among the Upstarts, idiosyncratic founders with limitless drive and an abundance of self-confidence. Young, hungry and brilliant, they are rewriting the traditional rules of business, changing our day-to-day lives and often sidestepping serious ethical and legal obstacles in the process.

The Upstarts is the definitive account of a dawning age of tenacity, creativity, conflict and wealth. In Brad Stone's highly anticipated and riveting account of the most radical companies of the new Silicon Valley, we find out how it all started, and how the world is wildly different than it was ten years ago.


truth, and escape with her life . . .

Year 12 Work Experience

Year 12 work experience is fast approaching, week commencing Monday 9th June 2025, and when we return after half term Year 12 will have a launch assembly to take them through the process. Placements are hard to secure and it is a big ask of any employer but remember it isn't always about securing a placement to support your future career. Think about the skills that might be useful for your future and what other opportunities might help you secure some of these. I would urge students to start thinking about what types of careers they are interested in and what they might like to do for work experience. Year 11 Post 16 Options Assemblies

National Citizen Service (NCS), will be coming in at the start of the spring term to discuss the programmes and experiences it has on offer for our Year 11 students. These summer workshops are truly invaluable in supporting students to learn, grow and develop into young adults.

Year 10 Career Interviews

All students in Year 10 are currently being offered an impartial and one-to-one careers interview with our external Careers Advisors Mrs Thompson and Ms Armstrong. Working with qualified and CDI-registered careers guidance practitioners, students have been supported in their careers interview to explore their aspirations, plan their future study pathways, and research their employment options. After their careers interview, each student has received a careers action plan with personalised targets to complete and aim towards; this is uploaded to their Unifrog profile.

In addition to our Year 10 sessions, Miss O'Brien has been offering support guidance sessions to students in Year 11 who are unsure of their Post 16 destinations. Students who would like a career guidance session, to discuss Post 16 and 18 options, with Miss O'Brien are encouraged to email her via kobrien@theweald.org.uk to arrange an appointment.

Year 11 College Application Deadlines

Year 11 students are currently in the process of applying to their desired Post 16 destinations. It is important that all students apply for a college place ready for September even if it is not your Plan A.

Sixth Form colleges will have deadline dates so please double check their websites to avoid submitting a late application.

Courses do get oversubscribed very quickly so it Is a good idea to get your application submitted by the end of January 2024 at the latest.
