## Message from Chair of Governors

**Governor Monitoring** 

It is important for governors to spend time in school outside of formal meetings to triangulate the reports they receive from senior leaders across the year.

Members of the governing body are linked both to subjects and to key areas of school life such as safeguarding, Special Educational Needs and wellbeing. Across the year, governors spend time in school talking to staff and students to monitor these areas.

In addition to this ongoing monitoring, this term governors immersed themselves in the school day joining students in lessons across all year groups and in a wide range of subjects. We also talked to students during social times to find out more about their views of the school.

This was a hugely rewarding experience. Governors saw many examples of the school's ethos of 'Opportunity and Community' across the school, noting in particular the high expectations, how well students work together and the mutual respect between students and staff.

# The Power of Routines—Being ready, respectful, working and safe (RRWS)

Creating a good routine for your child is very powerful and a game changer to learning. The key is to involve them in the planning so they understand the reasons and feel ownership of the routine. Routines that include these elements give children the best possible chance to do well at school:

- Set a daily schedule with the same wake-up times and bedtimes for each school day and stick to them
- Make study time for revision and homework part of your child's daily routine (1 hour a day for Y7 and 2 hours a day for Y11), allowing more time for study when assignments or exams are coming up
- Factor in time off knowing there's a reward for all that hard work is a great motivator

In school the routines are framed around being ready, respectful, working and safe (RRWS). Last term it was all about maximising learning time by being ready i.e. being on time to all lessons. At the start of the day, break and lunch, we have a 4 minute warning bell when students start moving to lessons and students should go to the toilet at break and lunchtime not during lesson time. These simple habits allow students to maximise their learning time in the classroom.

In the summer term our focus will be the start and end of lessons. This involves calmly entering class on time and immediately starting work to allow the teacher to take the register in silence. At the end of a lesson it will be checking if students have understood the content of the lesson, tidied the classroom and prepared to leave (including wearing the correct uniform) for the next lesson. Practising these routines makes them stick. Sticking to our routines allows our students to learn, consolidate and understand all they are taught every lesson.

As a school we are supported by Thought-Full who are the Mental Health Support Team in Schools for West Sussex. Thought-Full work with us to support students with mild to moderate mental health difficulties. In addition to this, Thought-Full provides parent presentations on different topics around mental health and supports the school with our whole school approach to Mental Health & Wellbeing.

This academic term we have run 3 successful parent presentations including sessions on Exam Stress and Talking to Teens. During the Sum-



mer term there will be further presentations we invite you to attend, including a rerun of the Thought-Full launch event from earlier this year in January. This will be our next presentation titled "What is Thought-Full?". It will be held on **Thursday 18 April from 6:00pm-7:30pm** in the school hall hosted by Greg Cronie. A number of our students have benefited from small sessions with the Thought-Full team. Last term year 13 students had a session on how to support themselves with exam stress leading up to their A level exams. The students who took part provided really positive feedback and have been given concrete examples to use to support themselves in the coming months. Year 11 students will benefit from further sessions after Easter to support them with their build up to the GCSE exams.

They introduced the students to cells and reflex actions for Biology; particles and reactions for Chemistry and static electricity and space for Physics.



#### National Careers Week 4 - 8 March

The week commencing 4 March saw The Weald support National Careers Week by offering all students a range of exciting, interactive, thought provoking careers activities to get involved in. Each house had a guest speaker to host a 'What's My Job?' assembly. We had representatives from Kreston Reeves, Border Force, Cripps, All About Horsham, AW Ship Management, Eurotherm and the Department for Education.

Tuesday 5th March saw Year 12 students attend the UCAS Fair at the University of Surrey to explore their Post 18 options and pathways. The trip was successful and all students took away a backpack full of prospectuses and leaflets as well as a few freebies!

Students in Years 10 - 13 also attended the Future choices Fair on Thursday 7 March. The event was then open to all year groups as well as parents after school and was well attended.

The Careers noticeboard in the LRC played an important role in allowing students to explore over 30+ careers ranging from salaries and progression to the qualifications and subjects required.

Students also had a whole school assembly on Friday 8 March to finish the week with the clear message that 'no qualification is a bad qualification'. We looked at transferable skills both hard and soft and how these combined will see you have a successful career in the future.

### **Future Choices Fair**

On Thursday 7 March The Weald hosted its annual careers fair which saw over 40 exhibitors ranging from Higher Education providers, training providers, FE Colleges and employers all come together to help students explore their future choices.

Students spent time walking around engaging with exhibitors gaining deeper insights and improving their understanding of qualification requirements, career pathways, entry routes and much more.

Students had the opportunity to speak to The British Army, Thakeham Homes, Creative Technology, University of Chichester, Kingston University, The Weald Sixth Form, Coco's Styles, Brighter Horizons, Oyster Worldwide, ASK Apprenticeships, Rewards Training, Forza Doors and Windows, Surrey and Sussex Police, Breathe HR and many many more. Thank you to all our exhibitors for giving up their free time to sup-

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port our students.











#### **Y8 Options Evening**

This year saw The Weald host its first Y8 Options Evening for students and parents. Miss O'Brien was in attendance and on hand to discuss the importance of making sure students choose the right subjects at GCSE and how this can support their future.

The evening was to support students with making better informed decisions at GCSE to allow them to build the best set of foundations to build upon at Post 16, Post 18 and beyond.

#### Y12 career interviews

Year 12 students have all been offered a Career Interview with one of our qualified, and CDI-registered, careers guidance practitioners. Students will be supported in their careers interview to explore their aspirations, plan their future study pathways, and research their employment options.

After their careers interview, each student will receive a careers action plan with personalised targets to complete and aim towards; this is uploaded to their Unifrog profile.

#### **Unifrog**

All students have a Unifrog account which they are supported and encouraged to access during RHPD, subjects and in their own time.

<u>Unifrog</u> is an online destinations platform used by students at The Weald across our careers programme to support with researching their study and employment interests.

Students can progressively add to their accounts providing them with regular opportunities to reflect on their achievements inside and outside of school. This also gathers a body of evidence to demonstrate the employability skills students have developed over time. This can, in turn, be used by students to support their next steps after Year 11 and Year 13, including applying for apprenticeships, employment, and further and higher education studies.

#### **Year 12 Personal Statements**

Whether you are considering University, Apprenticeships, Gap Year or Employment at Post 18 it is still incredibly beneficial and highly recommended that you complete your draft personal statement on Unifrog. You will look at this in greater depth during Tutor Time and RHPD sessions but ideally you will need to have started this by early May, continuing through the summer ready for the start of Year 13.

The Sixth Form Team and Miss O'Brien are on hand to support and encourage students with this.





#### Year 10 Work Experience

Students will be undertaking work experience during ACE Week, w/c 1 July - 5 July 2024, and are responsible for sourcing and securing their own placements.

We have around 300 Year 10 students hoping to secure a placement with employers in the local community and slightly further afield. With other local secondary schools competing for placements during the same week, it is important students are reaching out to employers to ask for placements and avoid leaving it until the last minute.

For this reason, we are always looking for employers who are happy to offer our young people the opportunity to join them on placement.
