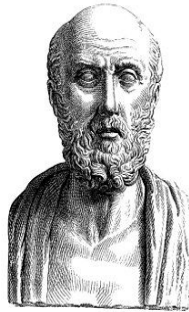


What do we owe to the classical world? - Knowledge Organiser:

Key dates:

776 BC	The first Olympic Games in Greece.
508 BC	Athens made the capital of Greece.
460 BC	Hippocrates was born.
43 AD	The Roman conquest of Britain.
79 AD	Mount Vesuvius erupts and buries Pompeii in ash
313 AD	Emperor Constantine says that it is no longer a crime to be Christian in the Roman Empire
410 AD	End of Roman rule in Britain.
476 AD	The Fall of the Roman Empire - Rome is overthrown by the barbarian leader Odovacar.



Key people:

Hippocrates	Greek doctor who came up with the Four Humours theory.
Galen	Roman doctor who developed the theory of opposites.
Constantine	Roman Emperor who converted to Christianity.
Pliny the Younger	Roman writer who described the eruption of Mount Vesuvius.

Classical	The interlocking civilisations of Ancient Greece and Rome
Polytheistic	Worshiping more than one god
Four Humours	A theory which stated that the body was made up of four liquids that needed to be balanced in order for a person to stay healthy
Hippocratic Oath	A promise made by doctors in which they promise to do their patients no harm
Gladiator	Someone who fought in an arena for people's entertainment
Democracy	A system under which the people vote for their leaders
Public Health	Governments and leaders making official changes to cities and towns to keep citizens healthy. Examples include baths and sewage systems.
Conquest	The act of taking over a country that is not your own and making it part of your empire.
City State	A city that has its own leader but is still part of a bigger country.
